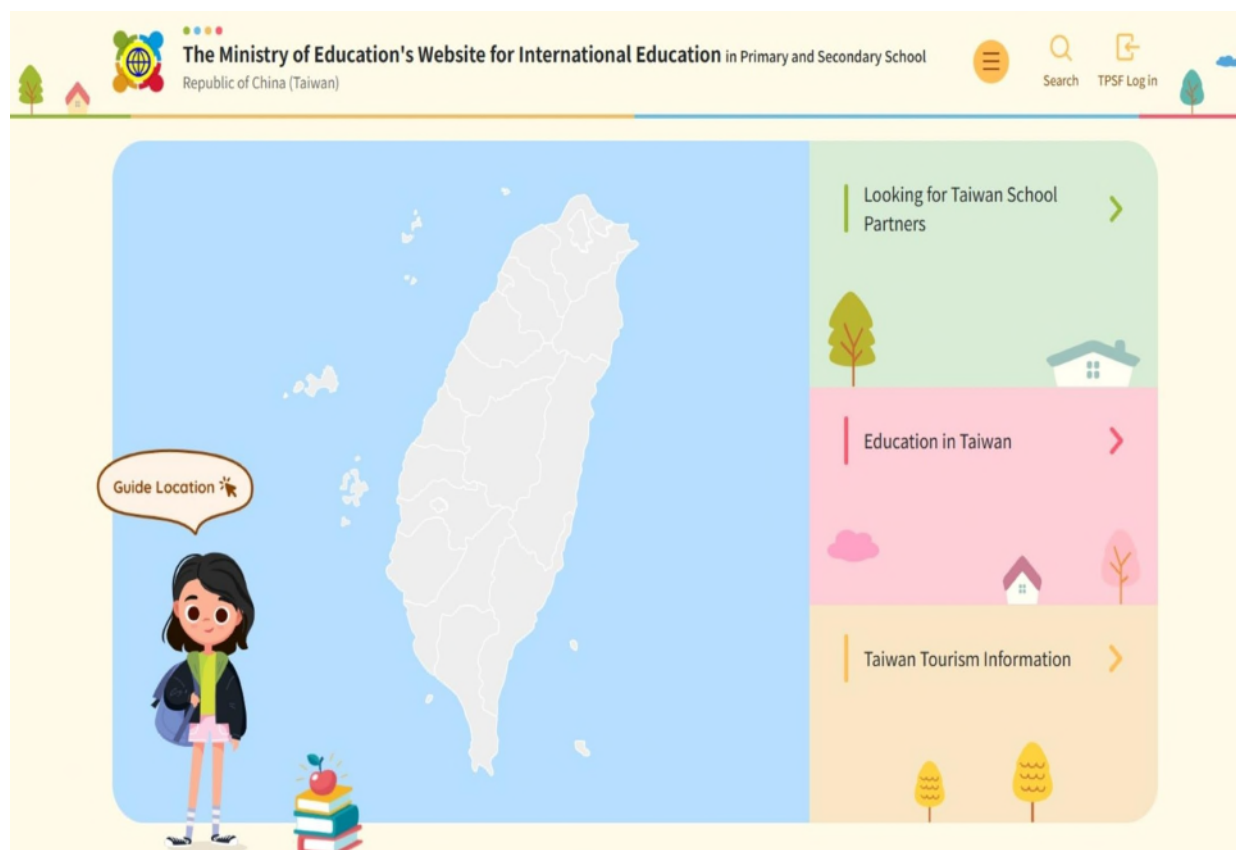


The K-12 Education Administration of the Ministry of Education Upgrades International Education Website to Connect 2,200 Schools Across Taiwan with Global Partners

To promote the Ministry of Education's Medium-Term Plan for International Education in Primary and Secondary Schools and boost global competitiveness across K-12 education, the K-12 Education Administration has completed a major overhaul and feature upgrade of the Website for International Education in Primary and Secondary School (<https://www.ietw2.edu.tw/>). Through the Taiwan Partner School Finder (TPSF) platform, the number of successful school matches has continued to grow. As of December 2025, the platform has attracted registrations from 2,209 schools in Taiwan and 410 schools overseas, connecting Taiwanese schools with partner schools across 16 countries and highlighting the strong potential of digital technology in facilitating international exchange.

The K-12 Education Administration noted that to create a more user-friendly experience for schools, the website underwent a comprehensive system upgrade in 2026, focusing on enhancing TPSF's services. Through digital transformation, the platform streamlines administrative

workflows, allowing educators to concentrate on implementing meaningful international education programs.

The English version of the Website for International Education in Primary and Secondary School also underwent a major redesign in late November 2025. Featuring a new homepage centered around a map of Taiwan, the new visual layout adopts a clean, understated design with warm colors and a clearer information hierarchy. Meanwhile, the TPSF platform has officially adopted its Chinese name, 臺灣夥伴學校國際配對平臺. Since its launch, the platform has seen a steady increase in successful school matches, rising from 152 in 2022 to a cumulative total of 402 by 2025, spanning 16 countries across Asia, Europe, Oceania, and the Americas. Schools in northern and southern Taiwan saw the highest engagement, while participation in eastern Taiwan and offshore islands has steadily grown thanks to regional support from the K-12 Education Administration. These efforts help domestic schools build long-term international partnerships while significantly expanding student engagement in global exchange.

In late 2025, the TPSF team partnered with Indonesia's International Global Network (IGN) to organize an online briefing, opening the door to the ASEAN market and bringing in 20 Indonesian educational institutions. The success of the platform has also attracted the attention of the Chungcheongnam-do Office of Education in South Korea, which has reached out to explore possible collaboration opportunities.

The K-12 Education Administration stated that it will continue to optimize its digital platform services and encourage primary and secondary schools nationwide to make good use of these resources.
